Name and Neighborhood Association/Organization you're representing Share a positive fall neighborhood effort (completed or planned)

- Randy Schubring, Slatterly Park. Sixth Street Bridge opening in the next 2-3 weeks. Neighborhood had involvement in design and planning of the bridge. Vintage light posts and planters included.
- Sue Rain, Washington. Police sergeant assigned to their neighborhood and has helped.
- Lisa Peterson, Washington.
- Bob Sixta, Folwell. Lots of residential remodeling occurring in neighborhood. Traffic off of 6th
 Street became a challenge. Has been addressed through NA and school. More kids walking to
 school now. A mini-library opened that looks like a rocket ship and has been popular with
 neighbors.
- Marilyn Meyer, Cimarron. Community garden raised bed constructed thanks to Project Grant.
 Community meeting about drive-by shooting led by Councilman Nick Campion was well attended.
 Three Police officers attended meeting. Case of random crime. Lots of improvement in Cimarron since 2006-2009.
- Nancy Slocumb, Historic SW. Free-flowing discussion in recent neighborhood association meetings have been well received. Heroin house situation resolved.
- Dave Dunn, Planning Department. Resided in Rochester 1 year, lives near Elton Hills. Previously worked in the city of Des Moines, Iowa, on neighborhood planning initiatives.
- Dave Edmonson, Kutzky Park. Kutzky Krawl progressive dinner across 3 different Kutzky
 households to build social connections. Halloween parade and party for the kids. Project grants
 completed with new park banners and raised garden beds to use next year. Dealing with drunks in
 the park. Officer suggesting ordinance to prohibit alcohol in the park unless group obtains permit.
 Police are concerned that if ordinance is instituted for Kutzky Park that the issues will overflow
 and have contacted Slatterly NA.
- Dick Denny, Sunnyside. There are no parking signs posted on north side of neighborhood and people are parking there.
- Kelly Dungan, Sunnyside. Crime issues on 11 ½ Street. Many rentals with slum lords (8 out of 13 owed by the same man). SWAT team has been onsite at least once a week for domestic situation.
 Neighborhood is working with Building Safety and end goal is to pull rental certificates.
- Mike LaPlante, Eastside.
