



Neighborhood Project Grants

This brand new RNeighbors program was developed from requests from neighborhood associaiton for acesss to small amounts of funding in which to carry out improvement projects. We started off in the spring of 2015 with funds from the City of Rochester and Olmsted County Public Health, with oversight from RNeighbors.

Offered once a year in the spring, these grants reimburse up to \$1,000 in costs for neighborhoods to complete projects that enhance a neighborhood's livability and involvement, benefit the entire neighborhood and promote a strong sense of community.

Each of the applications had to ensure that the neighbors would put in the volunteer effort to bring the project to completion by October 30, 2015. This year's winners were:

- 19th Ave SW Neighborhood: Little Free Library
- Cimarron Neighborhood: Raised "Discovery" garden bed with surrounding paver walkway
- Eastside Neighborhood: Fourth Street Community Garden with components of a "Community Board" and weekly speakers
- Homestead Addition Neighborhood: Pocket Park Improvement
- Homestead Trails Neighborhood: Community Garden Enhancement
- Kutzky Park Neighborhood: Community Garden raised beds
- Kutzky Park Neighborhood: Historic Neighborhood Signage
- Slatterly Park Neighborhood: Community Gardens Project




















OAKtoberfest Neighbor Awards

Green Initiative Award

Neighbor who spearheaded and developed green initiatives within their neighborhood, as a means to make Rochester a more environmentally sustainable place to live.

Joel Dunnette Nature in Your Neighborhood Project Nominated by Tara Freimund

Joel has been a leader of Zumbro Valley Audubon in Rochester since its formation 30 years ago. This summer he developed the Nature in Your Neighborhood Project, a free handson Saturday experience for children to learn about the natural world around them.

"Nature in Your Neighborhood has been a hit on many levels. Joel's authentic appreciation for sharing his passion for the natural world and transmitting that a group of squirrely kids and their sleepy, coffee laden parents on Saturday mornings has made Nature in Your Neighborhood grow in attendance and interest," said nominator Tara Freimund from the Kutzky Park neighborhood.

"Joel's professional experience and significant knowledge as a naturalist has offered a wealth of information, age appropriate materials and some fun in the park on sunny Saturday mornings, but what has struck me the most about these events is the genuine enthusiasm and interest Joel brings to each small hand having caught a bug in a net and every question murmured from behind the binoculars worn by the littlest amongst us as they spy the sight of a bird through the trees."

Innovative Action Award

Neighbor or group who has worked with the residents to make structural improvements to a neighborhood.

Jeff Urban, Community Outreach Bear Creek Church

Nominated by Mike LaPlante

Jeff has organized and coordinated rehab efforts in the Oak Terrace, Parkside and Eastside neighborhoods, with the end goal of helping people help themselves. He utilizes local talents and resources to help people better their own situations.

"Many churches try to help from the outside, but we have really strived to have "boots on the ground", said neighbor Justin Moreland. "He really adopts the mentality of helping without hurting, meaning that we try as best as we can to not swoop in with resources and expertise to help. Instead, those who we help almost always contribute what they can. If they are able, he will maybe show them how to do certain things, but then just drop tools off for them to do it themselves. Others help alongside volunteers and pay only for material costs. Many that we've helped will help with other projects."

"When I think of Jeff a Milton Berle quote immediately come to mind," said Mike LaPlante, President of the Eastside Pioneers Neighborhood Association. "If opportunity doesn't knock, Jeff builds them a door."

Green Thumb Award

Given to a neighbor or group who has improved their neighborhood, yard, or local community park.

Cathy Clermont Slatterly Park Neighborhood Association

Nominated by Brian Rognholt

Cathy has served as the organizer and point person for numerous community building efforts in her neighborhood that have not only brought neighbors together to work on projects, but have left a lasting impact in her neighborhood. She has spearheaded boulevard tree plantings, coordinated efforts to repaint their Flower Kaleidoscope street mural, volunteers at the neighborhood's Art on the Avenue effort, as well as worked in their community garden.

"Cathy is the point person for neighborhood projects and motivating others, said Brain Rognholt from the Slatterly Park neighborhood. "Her uplifting inspiration and hard work have made being a leader in our association much easier. She is the ultimate in what it means to be a service oriented 'good neighbor'!"

Mayor's Urban Forestry Volunteer Awards

Family

Angie, Ash, Milan and Amani Gupta. Karen and Edward Cohen.

This extended family of three generations has been helping in our neighborhood tree plantings since the spring of 2012. They proudly wear their tie-dyed planting T-shirts as a group when they go to public places like the Med City Marathon, State Fair or the Renaissance Festival.

"Rochester is a great community and part of what makes it great is its tree cover. These trees and forests increase safety, promote walking and biking, reduce the heat island effect, help with storm water management and bring neighbors together," said Edward Cohen.

"We're a busy, active family, so it's important to us to find opportunities where we can all volunteer together while also making a difference," said Angie Gupta. "After one neighborhood tree planting event Milan confided that it was his favorite volunteer activity ever. The boys also can watch the trees grow as they walk and bike through the neighborhood and feel a since of pride."

Organization Silver Creek Corners



Residents of Silver Creek Corners have attended Citizen Forester Trainings, helped in our community tree plantings and spent countless hours helping in the Indian Heights neighborhood park.

Working with the RNeighborWoods program and the Friends of Indian Heights (FOIH) allows us to give back to the community. It keeps Silver Creek Corner residents active with in the community and gives them meaningful work," said Chad Ramaker, from Center City Housing. "Their involvement helps to diminish stigma and allows residents to make meaningful relationships with unpaid staff and community volunteers. Trees and parks are a renewable resource we can do something about. It takes a lifetime to grow a large tree and pays dividends for the next generation."

Recognizing amazing citizens, for outstanding contributions to Rochester's urban forest.

Individual

Lindsey Meek

Lindsey first planted trees with RNeighborWoods in the mud when we planted 1,200 trees in one day on 50th Avenue NW, in the spring of 2012. Although that effort is certainly admirable she is receiving this award because of her ongoing efforts to advocate for public trees while serving on the Committee on Urban Design and Environment (CUDE) and the City Planning and Zoning Commission.

"As an engineer, it is my duty to hold paramount the safety of the public in all designs. The data and evidence is clear that the presence of trees along a street slows down motorists," said Lindsey. "With speeding a recurrent problem in almost every neighborhood, trees represent and critical piece of safety infrastructure, equal in importance to a stop sign or a pavement marking."

"Continued public education of the value of street trees and the urban forest is a message that cannot be shared widely enough. More education will lead to passion which will lead to advocacy for additional policies such as an urban forest master plan, which will include tree replacement requirements for all developments."

Individual

Nathan Runke

He is a graduate of the Urban Forestry bachelors program at the University of Wisconsin – Stevens Point, Certified Arborist and has been employed by the City of Rochester forestry division since 2006. Nathan has worked with the RNeighborWoods program since the summer of 2006 and has been instrumental in creating procedures to ensure the program is efficient and sustainable. The Neighborhood Tree Grant is a project that he has nurtured and helped form into the successfully streamlined effort it is today.

"Now that I have a child the ability to introduce him to natural areas without driving for hours has been amazing. For a guy that grew up surrounded by fields and wooded areas, to sum it up I feel like Rochester's urban forest is what makes Rochester a livable city"

OAKtoberfest Neighbor Awards (continued)



Legacy Award Given to an individual who through their dedication to community, volunteerism and talents has created a lasting positive impact on Rochester neighborhoods.

Robert Nowicki, (founding) RNeighbors Board member. Nominated by Mayor Ardell Brede.

In 1990 Rochester was named as one of the top places to live in the United States and Rochester experienced a growth flux. It was important to Mayor Canfield that the City kept some of the small-town feel to it as it expanded. Bob got involved in neighborhood work way back in 1996 when he was assigned by Mayor Chuck Canfield to the Mayor's Advisory Council on Neighborhoods. In 1996 Kutzky formed as the first recognized neighborhood association in Rochester with other downtown core neighborhoods such as Eastside and Slatterly Park soon following suite.

Attempting to collect information to assist these young neighborhood groups, this Advisory Council attended several Neighborhoods USA (NUSA) conferences, did research on national neighborhood efforts and eventually developed the idea for the Rochester Neighborhood Resource Center in 1999, incorporated as a nonprofit in 2001. By 2003 this little nonprofit rebranded itself as RNeighbors and there were 16 registered neighborhood associations. In addition to nurturing RNeighbors into the resource it is today, Bob has served as City Councilman and an RNeighbors Board member ever since 1999. He's played many different roles on the board including President and resident historian.

"Bob is a true Renaissance guy. As a lone staff person at RNeighbors he's invaluable," said RNeighbors Executive Director, René Lafflam. "I know I can give him a call and he can help me mediate through a tricky political situation or I can ask him to serve as a photographer, greeter, water distributor, resident woodworker, tree planter, picture hanger, or messenger, but always an advocate and cheerleader for Rochester neighborhood leaders."

Nominator Mayor Ardell Brede said, "It's a great honor for me to present the RNeighbors Legacy Award to an individual who epitomizes the qualities of this award--dedication to community & volunteerism--that is centered on neighborhoods. The Legacy Award, or "Good Neighbor award, goes to my dear friend and colleague...the original Barefoot Santa...Bob Nowicki!"
